43,675 people that we know of died from gun violence in 2022.

And we grieve.

An average of eighty people is killed by guns every day, including eight children.

And our hearts break.

79% of all homicides in the United States involve guns.

And we mourn.

An American child is twelve times more likely to die by a gun then children who live in all other twenty-five industrialized nations combined. Last year alone, 6,032 children age 17 and younger were hurt or killed by a gun.

# And we weep.

The annual economic cost of gun violence in America is estimated to at least \$100 billion. Medical costs, decimated families, the court system, our jails and prisons, and security measures in airports, schools, and public buildings all contribute to this sum.

## And sorrow sweeps over us.

Since John F. Kennedy was assassinated in 1963, more Americans have died by gun fire within our own country than American servicemen and women who were killed in all our wars of the 20th century.

### And we pray.

Suicides accounted for more than half of U.S. gun deaths

#### And we lament.

There are 393 million guns in the U.S. that is 120 guns for every 100 Americans We grieve for those are killed and those whose lives are forever changed; We seek to comfort for those who have lost loved ones;

We pray for a change of heart for those who resort to violence.

Faced with gun violence, may we educate; Organize; Advocate;

And in all the ways we can, work for that day when Guns and weapons of destruction

Are transformed into instruments of healing.

May it be so. Gun Violence Prevention

May we so do.

Hate crimes in the US rose to the highest level in more than a decade last year, according to an FBI report.

Hate crimes have been increasing in the US almost every year since 2014.

A hate crime is defined as offences "motivated by bias toward race, ethnicity, ancestry, religion, sexual orientation, disability, gender, and gender identity".

The FBI's annual Hate Crime Statistics Act (HCSA) report says there were 7,314 hate crimes last year, up from 7,120 the year before.

64.8% of victims of hate crimes were targeted based on their race. 15.6% were targeted because of their sexual orientation. 13.3% were targeted because of their religion. 4.6% were targeted because of their gender. And 1.7% of victims were targeted because they had a disability.

The data showed a nearly 7% rise in religion-based hate crime, with a 14% increase in crimes targeting Jews or Jewish institutions.

It also found anti-Latino hate crime rose 8.7% from 485 in 2018 to 527 in 2019 to the highest total since 2010.

Black people were targeted in hate crimes more than any other group in the US.

Half of all the hate crimes in the nation are committed by people between the ages of 15 and 24.[1]

At least 8 black people, 3 white people, 3 gay people, 3 Jewish people, and 1 Latino person become hate crime victims every day.[2]

"Sam's Story"- Pastor Alvin Hayes, St. Home Missionary Baptist Church

It all started one day someone pushed me during lunch at the playground and as I turned around to see who it was, the individual said, "Go back to your country." The people around him laughed at that comment. I was confused for the rest of the day as to what he meant as I thought I was in my country. I would eventually forget about it thinking it was a random one-off event. I didn't realize at that point that it would be a daily event in my life for most of my primary and secondary education... I got called a terrorist which hurt me a lot. I didn't want to cry because then they would know it affected me, so I also would not show emotions.

My education was affected as I wouldn't go to school and claim I was sick...

All of what happened made me feel like everybody was against me; like they were all talking about me and that they all hated me.

## I felt rejected and isolated and it messed with my self-confidence.

Having fewer friends meant more isolation and feelings of helplessness which led me to have depression and suicidal thoughts, which is still affecting me, and it brought on my persisting social anxiety...I was told of this quote that helped me a lot which the great Martin Luther King said once — "Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that". That quote always stopped me from using hate against hate and to always be happy and friendly.

I have always wanted to help people and this experience just intensifies that feeling further. So I have also been volunteering for multiple local and national groups which has been greatly beneficial in rebuilding my confidence which was tarnished by the bullies, gaining new skills and qualities and meeting new people...

I made good friends who helped me a lot with my mental health and I'm just glad I met them; they have been extremely helpful and supportive.

I'm now working and all is looking good. I've met a lot of new people and racism is now not a big problem as it was before. I am happy where I am now as I am learning new ways to cope with my depression and I have close friends with whom I can always talk to and meet...

As Nelson Mandela rightly said "No one is born hating another person because of the colour of his skin, or his background, or his religion. People must learn to hate, and if

they can learn to hate, they can be taught to love, for love comes more naturally to the human heart than its opposite".
